#### Voluntary and Open Membership

Electric service is available to anyone who is willing to accept the responsibilities of membership and lives with the certificated area regardless of race, religion, gender, or economic circumstance.

#### **Democratic Member Control**

HPP is a democratically controlled organization led by its elected 9-member Board of Directors.

#### **Members' Economic Participation**

- As a member you contribute

equitably to the cooperative and at least part of your capital contribution remains the common property of the cooperative. This helps to develop the cooperative. establish reserves, and support other activities approved by the membership and Directors.

#### **Autonomy and Independence**

HPP is an autonomous selfhelp organization controlled by you, our members. We enter agreements with other organizations. including government, for the benefit of our members and with only your best interests in mind.

#### Education, Training, and Information

Education and training for our members, directors, and employees help to keep members safe, the lights on, and your cooperative operating effectively and efficiently.

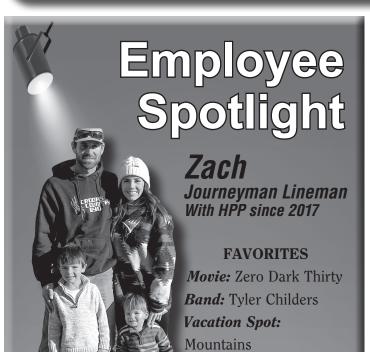
#### **Cooperation Among Cooperatives**
