
November 11th - Veterans Day Remember those who have served

"My name is Tim Wanke Sr, a retired Lieutenant Colonel and I had the distinct pleasure of hunting with Trapper Bradshaw recently. I would be remiss if I didn't write to thank High Plains Power for giving him the time to guide my son and me on our hunt.

His knowledge and skill allowed us to find and harvest two beautiful antelope. With his guidance he put us in position for the two shots, one being about 500 yards and the other about 258. Two days later I was on top of Copper Mountain stalking elk. After 5 set-ups, I harvested a 5 x 5 at a range of 576 yards with Trapper's rifle. During the hunt he had me climbing into rocks that I didn't think possible.


Unfortunately, after the shot my legs were like rubber and I was unable to help pack out the elk. Trapper cut the elk and brought out half on Sunday and the other half the next day.

I spent 28 years in the military, first in the Marine Corps with a tour in Vietnam. After university I joined the Army, too old for the Corps. I commanded an Infantry Rifle Company and a Blackhawk Aviation Battalion both in the 101st Airborne Division. My last job in the Division was Director of Plans, Training and Mobilization during Desert Storm. I have had a multitude of challenging assignments including the day surveillance of the East German/

Czech border. I say all of this to illustrate that I am a pretty good judge of character. As a Commander I would have fought to have Trapper in any of my organizations especially when the mission called for clear thinking, physical stamina and just plain grit. You must be proud of him. I hope that I will have the opportunity to hunt with him again. Thank you once again for lending us one of your best."

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First and foremost, thank you. and I check off a lifelong dream and thank you for creating a program to give back to our Nation's Veterans. One of the trophy's I received from my recent trip to Wyoming was my friendship with Trapper Bradshaw. By your company allowing "Trap" a few days off created a lifetime of memories between my father and I. I'm 42 and my dad is 77, so next season isn't a guarantee anymore. My introduction to Trapper was in Wyoming, but because of him, I harvested my fist antelope buck. Now it was dad's turn. I tagged stalk on his animal. After a quick set up, and using Trap's weapon, dad made a 250 yard heart shot company.

beautiful and COLD. We didn't see any elk that day but we had a great day nonetheless. The next day I hunted with Trap's partner Shawn Stepphan and took my first bull elk. Of course, I sent the first pics to Trap. Dad's hunt was difficult the following morning. Trap is part mountain goat so he would scout ahead for animals, and he found them. Trap assisted my father every step of the way. We climbed, crawled, cursed, but we got there. Dad missed a shot, but the animals reappeared. Another perfect 567 vard shot and the bull fell...far away. This bull was so far off the "path" that Trap had to guarter it and pack Thank you for helping my father it out...on his back. I helped a little, but I'm a Tennessee boy (lol). Four trips had to be made up and down the mountain (seemed like it was always up hill). But it got done, only because of Trap.

Trap is also euro mounting the elk skulls for us, too. Trap was 100% engaged the entire time we spent with him. Honest, hardworking (the mountain goat part), genuine person whom I have the pleasure of knowing because of High low crawling through every cactus Plains Power and your exemplary program. I'm in debt to you and Trap for the perfect memories I made with my father. Please along while Trap, and dad put a continue to use Mr. Bradshaw to help fellow veterans.
